

Spring is in the air...welcome to the month of March! Are you ready to start digging in the dirt? This month, the gardening season increases in intensity and it's a perfect time to get some outdoor activity as the weather warms up.

## **Butterfly of the Month**



#### Olive Juniper Hairstreak

Callophrys gryneus, the "olive" juniper hairstreak

I first saw the "olive" juniper hairstreak, *Callophyrs gryneus*, last summer during a butterfly count nectaring on *Eryngium aquaticum*, commonly called Corn snakeroot near Goethe State Forest. A fun dime-sized butterfly to introduce to those of you who have not seen these beauties on St. Patrick's day. The upper side of the "olive" juniper hairstreak is tawny orange or a bronzy color in males, and blackish brown in females. The underside of the wings is bright green with a variable amount of brown scaling. Habitats include bluffs, open fields, barrens, and dry or rocky open places. They are almost always found near or on junipers in these habitats.

Snakeroot (Eryngium aquaticum)

Eryngium aquaticum, aka snakeroot, is a coarse, aquatic perennial that's found naturally in sunny marshes and swamps, along pond edges and in ditches. In the Goethe State Forest it grows along the sides of the highway for a couple miles in the ditches during the summer and early fall at about 3-5 feet tall and provides nectar for a variety of pollinator species. Snakeroot blooms vary in color from a pale whitish-blue to a rich lavender. Flowerheads are about 1/2" to 1" in diameter, globular and are surrounded by spiny bracts. Snakeroot typically flowers summer through late fall through zones 7-9 in Florida. In a home landscape setting, snakeroot may require a little more care than other wildflowers. It does not tolerate drought, so moist to wet and acidic soils must be maintained. Preferred sun exposure is full sun to moderate shade. It is not a very prolific re-seeder, so plants may need to be replaced periodically. Despite its maintenance needs, it is an interesting and beautiful addition to a mixed wildflower garden.

#### **Plant of the Month**



Pink Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnata)

Our Best Seller! Pink Swamp Milkweed (Asclepias incarnata) is one of over twenty milkweeds that are native to Florida. Pink swamp milkweed's leaves are long (up to 6 inches). Seeds are flat and brown with silky white hairs attached which come from pods, and split open when ripe. Seeds are dispersed when their silky hairs catch the wind.

Swamp milkweed occurs naturally in floodplain swamps, hydric hammocks, wet pine flatwoods and marshes. It typically blooms in summer and attracts many pollinators. It is a larval host plant for monarch, queen and soldier butterfly caterpillars. In my garden it grows in partial shade and sunny locations - both in pots and in the ground. Once established, it does well in regular Florida conditions. It goes dormant around late October-November. It may appear above ground not to be viable at this point. If the roots are still viable, the plant will come back from the roots. Sometimes it will even skip a year and come up the 3rd year and every year after that, which is part of the native plant cycle.

### In Pollinator & Native News

#### If you plant it they will come!

March is here and it is time to focus on planning your garden with native plants. Make sure you incorporate both host plants for adult butterflies to lay their eggs on for the caterpillars to eat and plant nectar plants for the adult butterflies to nectar on as well as other pollinators. It is ideal to plant a palette of native blooming plants of different sizes to provide nectar for many different species as well as other pollinators. Do not let the word "weed" detour you from many of the native species. Afterall we love milkweed that provides the habitat for Monarch and Queen butterflies – so give the other plants with the word "weed" in their name a chance. For example, the native Blue Porterweed (Stachytarpheta jamaicensis) is a drought tolerant plant that grows low to the ground and a wonderful nectar stop for pollinators.
