Variegated Fritillary

Variegated Fritillaries are medium-sized (wingspan 1 3/4 - 3 1/8 inches) with a beautiful pattern of various shades of toffee on its upper wings. The underside of its wings is more muted in color and resembles a dry leaf. This helps camouflage the butterfly when it's sitting with closed wings. (See Photos #1 and #2.)

Females lay pale green or creamy white eggs on new growth of its host plants. In our area, host plants include Passionflowers (*Passiflora spp.*), Violets (*Viola spp.*), and Florida Yellow Flax (*Linum floridanum*). There are typically three generations each year.

Variegated Fritillaries tend to be found in open, sunny areas flying low to the ground or nectaring on Frogfruit (*Phyla nodiflora*), Bidens (*Bidens spp.*) or other low-growing flowers. More shy and less abundant than its cousin, the Gulf Fritillary, the closest place we reliably see this beauty is Brooker Creek Preserve. Host Plant Of The Month



Common Blue Violet (Viola sororia)

Found throughout much of Florida, Common Blue Violet (*Viola sororia*) is our state's most common violet. Tiny (about 6- to 10-inches tall and wide), but mighty, this long-lived perennial is an important part of our natural food chain: a number of fritillary butterflies use it as a host plant for their caterpillars. Its leaves are eaten by rabbits and deer, and small mammals and birds eat its seeds. In moderation, humans can also eat violet leaves and flowers --- here's recipe for a violet glaze and here's a recipe for a blackberry and violet scone.

Common Blue Violet occurs naturally in semi-shady woodlands and hammocks. It prefers dappled sun or shade although it can adapt to sunnier (but not full sun in our area) locations if kept moist. The plant is one that is dormant in winter ---- its emergence from the ground is a true indication that spring has arrived.

Violets self-seed readily and will spread. Consider planting it as an understory plant in your wildflower garden and let us know how it goes. Email your photos to info@ButterflyTampa.com. We'd love to hear from you!

(Fun fact: Violets are one of the two flowers traditionally included in a bouquet for a 50th wedding anniversary because they symbolize affection and loyalty. The other flower is a yellow rose, which symbolizes friendship and joy.)

Nectar Plant of the Month



Christmasberry (Lycium carolinianum)

Christmasberry is a woody, evergreen shrub that natively occurs along Florida's coastal counties from Bay and Duval Counties south to the Keys. Highly salt tolerant and resistant to hurricane winds, this plant typically grows 6- to 8-feet tall and 3- to 5-feet wide. Most often found at the edge of salt marshes and mangroves, on sandy shell mounds, or dunes, Christmasberry produces delicate flowers that vary in color from bluish-white to deep lavender. These flowers typically appear in the fall and winter, although in the Tampa Bay area the plant does flower intermittently throughout the year.

The plant does best in full sun and sandy soils with high pH. Christmasberry exhibits signs of stress when it faces drought conditions.

Christmasberry gets its common name from the large, brilliant red, egg-shaped berries it produces in abundance in December. A favorite food source for many birds, this plant is an especially important source of nourishment for our overwintering bird populations when little else is available. It is also a great nectar source for hummingbirds, Great Southern Whites, Gulf Fritillaries, and sphinx moths.

Christmasberry makes a great addition to gardens where it can be used as a specimen plant or grouped to form a hedge. Please note, however, that the plant is somewhat thorny and unripe fruits are poisonous to human and ripe and unripe fruits are poisonous to some animals. Plant in areas your pets and children can't reach to minimize poison risks.


Maypop Passionvine (Pasiflora incarnata)

Maypop (*Passiflora incarnata*) is a rapidly growing, short-lived woody vine that can grow up to 25' long and about 5' wide. Equally happy in a pot or planted in the ground, this vine will climb anything it can grasp, from trellis to tomato cage to other plants. The showy purple flower gives way to a fruit that matures to a yellowish color. If you can grab some of the fruit before the birds do, you can make some wonderful jellies and drinks. The leaves can be used for teas. Indigenous peoples poultice Maypop roots to treat inflammation and cuts.

Maypop does well in full sun and can tolerate partial shade. It's a host plant for Gulf Fritillary, Julia Heliconian, Zebra Heliconian, and Variegated Fritillary caterpillars. It's a nectar source for pollinators and birds and small mammals appreciate its fruit. Why not #NurtureNative and include it in your garden? Be careful, though. The plant has an extreme flammability rating so don't plant it within the defensible space of your home.




WINTER NATURE CAMP FUN!

Reptile of the Month: Tbd



Meet the Southern Black Racer (*Coluber constrictor*), one of Florida's most commonly encountered snake species! These non-venomous snakes are frequent visitors to residential areas and play a crucial role in our local ecosystem.

Adult black racers are easily recognized by their sleek, black or bluish-black bodies and white chin. However, juvenile racers look dramatically different - they're gray with distinctive reddish-brown blotches, which unfortunately leads many people to mistakenly identify them as venomous species. These fast, agile snakes are diurnal predators that help control populations of frogs, lizards, small mammals, and insects. While they don't constrict their prey like some snake species, they use speed and quick jaw movements to catch and consume their food.

Although we don't have black racers in our living exhibit, keep an eye on our back garden - we've spotted a few local residents slithering through the native plants! These snakes are known for their distinctive behavior of moving with their head and neck raised above the ground, scanning their environment.

Black racers are found throughout Florida in diverse habitats from pine flatwoods to suburban neighborhoods. If cornered, they may strike defensively, but they're not aggressive and typically prefer to flee when approached.

Visit Butterfly Tampa and keep a lookout in our garden for a chance to spot these fascinating snakes!

Invertebrate of the Month: Regal Jumping Spider



Meet Celeste, our female regal jumping spider!

Regal jumping spiders (*Phidippus regius*) are known for their charismatic personalities, bright colors, and hunting capabilities. Regal jumping spiders are commonly found in the Southeastern portion of the United States and parts of the Caribbean.

Regal jumping spiders are sexually dimorphic, showing two distinct colors attributed to sex.

Females of this species have markings ranging in orange and white hues. Conversely, males are black and white, with a face-like marking on their abdomen. Both sexes of this species have iridescently colored fangs, which make them stand out from other species of spider.

Celeste is our December Bug of The Month as a representative of a Christmas tale about spiders called "The Christmas Spider". Though there are many variations of the story, one of them is as follows:

"A long time ago a mother was cleaning for Christmas. Spiders fled up to the attic to escape the broom. On quiet Christmas Eve, the spiders slowly came down for a peek. "Oh, what a beautiful tree!" In excitement, they scurried up and out along each branch. They were filled with happiness as they climbed amongst the glittering beauty. But alas! The tree was shrouded in their dusty, grey web by the time they were done. When Santa came with gifts for the children and saw the tree covered with spider webs, he smiled because he saw how happy the spiders were but knew how heartbroken the mother would be if she saw it covered in dusty webs. So, he turned the webs into strands of silver and the tree was even more beautiful than before. And so began why we put tinsel on our trees, and why you should add a Christmas spider to the branches of yours."
